

A to Z: Establishing a Successful Community Based Reentry Program

Candy Christophe, LCSW, LAC-Founder, Reentry Solutions

Following your passion for a non-profit is not easy and the books miss a few things. This session will cover how Reentry Solutions developed and grew to where it is today serving the Alexandria community through several grants and strategic partnerships.

A Challenge: Child Support Payments

There are many hurdles people face after spending time incarcerated. For some parents, this means child support obligations. This workshop will explain the types of debts that may be owed for child support, how to address them, and the potential for changes in the future.

We will show how the collaboration in New Orleans was solidified in the wake of the Justice Re-Investment Initiative package passed into significant difference in outcomes. Effective Community Engagement from the P & P Perspective

Jobs for Life™ (JfL) is an eight-week training program which offers a unique solution to poverty and joblessness in communities and for individuals across the country. Today, churches and ministries in over 160 cities and 34 states are leading Jobs for Life training classes. These classes provide biblical job training, ongoing assistance and hope to those in their community who are struggling with finding and keeping meaningful employment.

Executing Comprehensive Services for Women Returning Home

Connections for Life, through the collaborative networking of support services, fosters the development of a healthy lifestyle pattern for women who are single and indigent, and who are in transition from dependence to independence. The journey to providing comprehensive services is not an easy one and for women these services have to be targeted and sustained.







From a Woman's Perspective: Help Is What We Need

Dolfinette Martin, Statewide Organizer for VOICE OF THE EXPERIENCED (VOTE)

Reentry begins when an incarcerated person is released, any work done prior to setting foot outside the prison gate is preparation. So with this in mind understanding that women's reentry has it's own unique set of barriers. Some are mothers with juvenile children and the very first barrier they face is safe affordable housing for them and their kids. But we can't get any of the many barriers out of the way without help. Real help!

GNOHA #PutHousing First

Through the Put Housing First campaign, HousingNOLA and its partners will strengthen its ability to engage decision-makers and increase their accountability to sound housing policies that address this growing affordability crisis. The cost of doing nothing will mean the ongoing housing crisis will continue unchecked. The Put Housing First campaign will help tip the scales by holding government decision-makers accountable to sound, sustainable, equitable policies that address affordability for all, including special needs populations whose housing needs go overlooked by policy makers.

How to Plan a "Clean Jacket" Day

For many individuals, an expungement creates access to sustainable employment or housing. It can also shield individuals from discrimination after contact with the criminal justice system. This panel will discuss what an expungement does, how to help others gain access to it, and what to do after the event to promote systemic change.

Improving Access to Health Care: Louisiana Best Kept Secrets (Federally Qualified Health Centers)

Matthew Valliere, Chief Executive Officer, Care South

Federal Qualified Health Center (FQHC): FQHCs are outpatient clinics that qualify for specific reimbursement systems under Medicare and Medicaid. FQHCs include federally-supported health centers. Health centers are community-based and patient-directed organizations that deliver comprehensive, culturally competent, high-quality primary health care services. Returning citizens and service providers will learn how to access and benefit from these services.

Louisiana Department of Corrections and Louisiana Sheriffs – A Team Effort"

Sheriff Craig Webre, Lafourche Parish Sheriff's Office

Tara Sutton, Program Coordinator

Captain Jessica Bordelon, Commander, Transitional Work Program

Sheriffs have a unique perspective in the Criminal Justice System. They are the Chief Law Enforcement Officer of their respective parish and, at the same time, they operate the parish jail. In some respects, the Criminal Justice System begins and often ends with the Sheriff. The relationship between the Louisiana Department of Corrections and Louisiana Sheriffs differs than that of most other states. The presentation will examine this relationship in terms of challenges and opportunities, the incarceration rates, reentry and the incarceration of readjudication detainees.

La Housing Authority: Affordable Housing Options for Returning Citizens

Nicole Sweazy, Executive Director, Louisiana Housing Authority Verna Bradley Jackson, Executive Director, One Touch Ministry

Attendees will learn about affordable housing opportunities to assist people as they re-enter society. The partnership between the Department of Corrections and the Louisiana Housing Corporation and current programs will be highlighted during the workshop. Practical advice from a service provider will be part of the presentation, on pitfalls and work-arounds for housing challenges.

The Louisiana Prisoner Reentry Initiative (LA-PRI) is an outcome of Justice Reinvestment Task Force and has as its goal is to reduce recidivism by investing dollars saved into community resources. Starting in the five highest incarceration parishes – St.Tammany, Orleans, Jefferson, East Baton Rouge, and Caddo – local citizens, service agencies, and businesses in each parish began forming Coalitions and then Steering Teams and committees to develop and organize community resources to meet these anticipated needs. This presentation will reflect on how this implementation is progressing.







Promoting Reentry to Economic and Workforce Development Organizations

Sondra Cooley-Redmon, Director of Workforce development for Central Louisiana Economic Development Alliance

This workshop will provide tools to assist reentry organizations in connecting with economic and workforce development organizations in their regions. The workshop will help organizations understand the importance of working with local workforce development offices, how to help those organizations understand the role of re-entry programs in the community's success, and what strategies to employ to encourage partnerships. Participants will leave with an understanding of how to connect their mission to that of other organizations, to ensure there is a place at the community table for your constituents.

Sexual Trauma Awareness & Response (STAR) Part 1 Sexual Trauma 101 & Part 2 Responding to Disclosures (Must have attended Part 1)

101: Interactive training through which participants learn about the problem of sexual violence, including types, impacts, causes and solutions. Part 2: Building upon Part 1, this module will help participants build skills to respond to disclosures of sexual violence.

Social Commerce can be a viable means of "barrier free" financial independence for returning citizens. Learn about the different types of social commerce, varying compensation plans and the nuances which makes it an opportunity.

Success Path to Business Ownership: Pathway to Success

RisingFoundations unique workforce development program fosters self-sufficiency through self-employment and small business development enabling clients to bypass discrimination by employers. The small business incubator empowers formerly incarcerated people to develop small businesses to (at first) supplement their income while they continue working low-wage jobs, with an overall goal for these businesses to grow, providing full time employment for themselves, and eventually other formerly incarcerated people.

Success in Reentry Housing in Opelousas: The Story of The Refinery Mission

Johnny Carriere, Executive Director, The Refinery Mission

The Refinery Mission is a faith-based emergency and transitional facility in Opelousas, LA. We are a Catalyst for Men in Transition. I'll be sharing our story and how it intersects with Reentry efforts in our state and community. We serve unaccompanied men 17-years-old and up. Our residents come from jails, prisons, hospitals, behavioral clinics, addiction rehabs, and the streets. Our programs are built on the foundation of the Gospel of Jesus Christ.

Checo Yancy, Director, Voters Organized to Educate for VOTE

This session will share where "Voices of the Experience" originated, from the inside of the Louisiana State Prison (Angola) emerging from the Angola Special Civic Project (ASCP). VOTE is a grassroots organization with decades of experience examining the root causes of crime, the criminal justice system, and the challenges of reentry. Vote takes a holistic, public health approach to community problems, and strive for healthy, sustainable communities.

Understanding and Responding to the Mental Health and Addiction Community-based Needs of the Judicially-Involved Individuals

Much is known of the individual with mental health and addiction needs from screening and assessing them while detained in East Baton Rouge Parish Prison. To help these individuals successfully reenter the community requires that providers understand their needs and provide appropriate and accessible services. This presentation will inform community providers on how to identify and match these justice-involved individuals with services that support successful reintegration.
